

Speaking up for Perth-Wellington

Randy Pettapiece has been working hard on behalf of the people of Perth-Wellington, representing our values and voicing our concerns. Here are just a few of his recent actions:

- Introduced and passed a motion calling on the government to address policies harmful to rural and small-town Ontario; the motion was successfully adopted with support from MPPs of all parties.
- Called on the Minister of Health to do more to address the family doctor shortage in our area.
- Supported local tradespeople calling on the government to abolish the College of Trades and eliminate new fees on tradespeople and employers.
- Held the government to account on excessive regulations facing farmers and small businesspeople.



- Attended meetings of the Perth and Wellington Federations of Agriculture, Christian Farmers, various local commodity groups, and brought concerns to the government's attention.
- Celebrated Ontario Agriculture Week by hosting agriculture open houses in Mitchell and Arthur.
- Continued to speak up for our communities' right to be heard on energy projects including industrial wind turbines.
- Urged the government to reconsider its cancellation of the Slots at Racetracks agreement, which has sustained the horse racing industry.
- Joined local agencies and three other MPPs for a roundtable discussion on social services.
- Nominated some of Perth-Wellington's most accomplished volunteers and community leaders in business, the arts, education and the environment to receive the Queen's Diamond Jubilee medal.
- Met frequently with municipal partners to address their concerns and support their priorities.
- Successfully addressed numerous constituent concerns and attended community events and anouncements across our riding.

LEGISLATURE BACK IN SESSION

On February 19, Randy and other MPPs returned to Queen's Park after it was shut down over four months earlier. On October 15, the outgoing (former) Premier announced his resignation as Premier. He also prorogued the legislature, shutting down debate, eliminating all proposed legislation, and cancelling the legislature's all-party committee hearings, including those scheduled to review the cancelled gas plants in Oakville and Mississauga.

Putting rural Ontario back on the radar

The needs of rural and small-town Ontario were the subject of a September debate initiated by Randy Pettapiece. The rural-urban divide, MPPs agreed, cannot be ignored.

Following debate on September 6 in the Ontario legislature, MPPs from all parties voted to support a private member's motion that Pettapiece introduced.

His motion called on the provincial government to reevaluate policies that negatively affect residents of rural and small-town Ontario.

"I'm very pleased that we put rural Ontario back on the radar," said Pettapiece after the vote. "My motion was intended to highlight the rural-urban divide. I also wanted to get MPPs thinking about ways to bridge that divide." During the debate, Pettapiece brought forward a range of other issues affecting rural Ontario, including:

- the lack of any meaningful local input on industrial wind farms;
- cancellation of the Slots at Racetracks revenue-sharing agreement;
- over-regulation in agriculture;
- school transportation procurement policies; and
- skyrocketing hydro costs affecting manufacturing.

Pettapiece also challenged MPPs, rural and urban, to focus on building the province to the benefit of all regions.

Advocating for those who need a family doctor

The Ontario government must do more to address the shortage of family doctors – especially in our area, says MPP Randy Pettapiece.

"Too many families still don't have a local, trusted family doctor," said Pettapiece. "Family physicians are essential to a strong local health care system."

Many of Pettapiece's constituents have called because they are unable to find a family doctor in Stratford.


Within the next year, the Minto-Mapleton area is expected to lose two long-serving doctors and Arthur is expected to lose one.

"Without a family doctor, people may have no real alternative but a trip to the emergency room," said Pettapiece.

Pettapiece has written many times to Minister of Health and Long-Term Care, calling on her to show leadership to ensure we have the family doctors we need. He has also spoken about the issue in the Ontario legislature and submitted a written question to the minister, compelling the government to respond.

Pettapiece strongly supports local recruitment efforts, including those of the Huron-Perth Healthcare Alliance and the Wellington Health Care Alliance, as well as efforts led by area municipalities.

"We're fortunate to have strong local leadership from our health professionals and our municipalities to help bring doctors to our area," said Pettapiece.

Provincial auditor examines Drive Clean program

Auditor General Jim McCarter's 2012 Report examined the cost and effectiveness of the Drive Clean program, along with other examples of poor value for money in the provincial government.

Drive Clean is Ontario's mandatory vehicle emissions inspection and maintenance program, which requires vehicles at least seven years old to undergo emissions testing.

Since the program's introduction, over 75 percent of improvements in vehicle emissions were caused by factors other than the program, according to the Ministry of the Environment's own figures. The auditor also found that some vehicles leaving the program with only partial repairs were actually worse off for the environment.

The program is required for residents of Perth and Wellington counties, but not for residents in several neighbouring counties. That's not fair, Pettapiece believes, especially when the program's effectiveness is in question. In April 2012, Pettapiece wrote to the Minister of the Environment to highlight concerns from the County of Perth and demand answers from the government.

Drive Clean Facts

- Under new testing requirements for 2013, vehicles with the "check engine" light on will fail.
- Light-duty vehicles in Perth and Wellington counties are subject to Drive Clean emissions testing, but vehicles registered in Huron, Bruce and Grey counties are exempt.
- Through the Drive Clean program, the Ministry of Environment collects \$30 million annually in fees from vehicle owners.


Highway 7/8: making our voices heard

Randy Pettapiece has been working hard to represent local concerns on the province's plans for Highway 7/8. Here are just a few of his actions:

- Requested and received a full ministry briefing with senior Ministry of Transportation staff.
- Attended Perth County Council's joint meeting with the councils of Perth East and Perth South.
- Spoke in the Ontario legislature and called on the Minister of Transportation to address community concerns.
- Wrote to the Minister of Transportation on issues of heritage preservation, safety considerations, economic impacts, the environment, regional traffic flow, movement of agricultural equipment, fair consideration of property values, among many other issues.

- Discussed the issue with affected constituents.
- Supported the Agriculture Business Community in its call to extend the feedback deadline for the updated Highway 7/8 proposals. Following Randy's letter to the minister, the extension was granted.
- Encouraged constituents to submit ideas and concerns following the release of updated Highway 7/8 route proposals in the summer. Randy brought constituents' views to the Minister of Transportation and project team.
- Requested information from the Minister of Transportation on behalf of citizens by submitting written questions, with which MPPs can compel the government to respond.

The next opportunity for local residents to see the latest Highway 7/8 design proposals will be at the Public Information Centre (PIC) #6, tentatively scheduled for spring 2013.

Skilled trades set to face new fees, regulation

This year, skilled tradespeople are facing new fees and regulations. Many believe this could ultimately affect the cost of building new roads or schools, and even the price of a haircut.

The provincial government created the College of Trades to regulate approved trades. Intended to oversee certification, training, and policies and procedures, it will not, however, directly train workers or teach any courses.

The College will be funded by mandatory new membership fees. In 2013, the College will begin by charging \$60 from apprentices and \$120 from journeypersons and employers. That is on top of any existing licensing, certification or qualification fees.

Randy Pettapiece is concerned the College will drive up costs and discourage those seeking careers in the trades.

In November, Pettapiece invited his colleague, MPP Garfield Dunlop, to Perth-Wellington to discuss the issue with local tradespeople. They participated in a public meeting hosted by the Stratford and Area Builders' Association (SABA).

Discussion focused on issues including apprenticeship reform, compulsory certi-

fication, and the College of Trades and its mandatory fees.

Pettapiece agreed with Dunlop that the government should abolish the College of Trades. The MPPs also support changes to increase the number of skilled trades workers.

"Those workers need jobs, and Ontario needs those workers," said Pettapiece.
